## Our vision for music at Battle

At Battle Primary Academy, we want children to experience music as a unique way of communicating that can inspire and motivate their own personal expression. Music can play an important part in the personal development of children; it allows them to reflect and links closely with their spiritual development. Music reflects the culture and society we live in, and so the teaching and learning of music at Battle Primary Academy enables children to develop curiosity for different cultures and ideas. Besides being a creative and enjoyable activity, music can also be a highly academic and demanding subject and music lessons at Battle Primary Academy boost resilience through learning to perform, compose and even read music notation.

We believe that Music is a universal language that embodies one of the highest forms of creativity. We aim to ensure that all pupils receive high quality teaching in the subject of music. We aim to motivate and inspire all pupils to fulfil their potential, including those who show strong musical ability and talent on an instrument or voice. We aim to develop strong listening skills, which can be then used across the wider curriculum.

Through their music learning, we aim to increase the child's self-confidence, ability to work cooperatively as part of a team and to give them a sense of achievement. We value music as a form of confidence building, expression, as a social subject and for enjoyment. It is also a way of artistically promoting our school and helps to unite the local community. We aim to extend our musical performances with the local community and encourage children to take up opportunities to link with other musicians.

## Intent

The aims of our musical curriculum are:

- Can sing and use their voices individually and in a group
- Create and compose music on their own and with others
  - Use technology appropriately when composing
  - Have opportunities to learn a musical instrument
- Understand and explore how music is created, produced and communicated
- Listen to, review and evaluate the work of great composers and musicians from a range of historical periods, genres, styles and traditions

## Implementation

Music is taught through the Kapow Musical School programme. The children develop their understanding, make musical judgements, apply their new learning, develop their aural memory, express themselves physically, emotionally and through discussion and create their own musical ideas.

## Impact

Our school uses the Kapow scheme as the basis for our curriculum planning. This scheme has an integrated, practical, exploratory and child-led approach to musical learning. The learning within this scheme is based on:

- Listening and Appraising,
- Musical Activities (including Creating and Exploring)
- Singing and Performing.

While there are opportunities for children of all abilities to develop their skills and knowledge in each unit, the progression planned into the scheme of work means that the children are increasingly challenged as they move through the school. All musical learning in the scheme is based around the Interrelated Dimensions of Music; pulse, rhythm, pitch, tempo, dynamics, timbre, texture, structure and notation.

<p>Overall Objectives</p>	<p>At Battle Primary Academy, music is a way for children to express their emotions enjoyably and creatively. It plays an important role in personal development and at Beeston Primary School we aim to provide opportunities for all children to create, play, perform, listen, analyse and enjoy music across a wide range of periods, genres and styles. We are committed to ensuring children understand the value and importance of music in the wider community and aim to provide opportunities for children to use their musical skills, knowledge and experiences to involve themselves in music, in a variety of different contexts.</p>
<p>Key components</p>	<p><b>Music curriculum, including use of music technology</b> – EYFS, KS1, KS2, SEND Teachers deliver music following the Kapow programme, designed specifically for the teaching of music in primary schools. Kapow lessons are planned in sequences to provide children with the opportunities to review, remember, deepen and apply their understanding. Kapow meets all components of the Model Music Curriculum. Teachers are able to produce inclusive lessons for all children to access the musical curriculum in a fun and engaging way, further promoting a love of learning.</p> <p><b>Classroom instrumental teaching</b> The children benefit from an external music teacher visiting school weekly, offering whole class recorder teaching for children in Year 3. Throughout their primary music curriculum journey, children will learn how to play Glockenspiels, within our music scheme. Playing instruments enables children to use a range of methods to create notes, as well as how to read basic music notation.</p> <p><b>Links with external music organisations</b> We have links with Berkshire Maestro, who offer whole class music teaching and support with our musical offering throughout school. Children have the opportunity to learn and play as part of a rock ensemble, with Rocksteady. Each week, an external music teacher visits school and teaches children how to play a rock instrument, or sing, as part of a</p>

	<p>band. The band takes part in termly performances where parents and the rest of the school can come and watch</p> <p><b>Music CPD</b> Teachers have access to online CPD through our scheme Kapow. Each lesson has a teacher CPD section that helps teachers understand key vocabulary and how to teach each lesson to the best of their ability. The music lead shares CPD opportunities with staff throughout the year via email and face to face conversations.</p> <p><b>Performance opportunities</b> Our children take part in weekly singing in assemblies. We offer a school choir and perform throughout the year.</p>
